

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Supporting pets in low-income homes

RSPCA Suffolk Central Clinic

One of our branch's USPs is our Clinic in Ipswich. The clinic has been running for over 60 years providing basic treatments from the building in St. George's Street, Ipswich every Tuesday and Friday. Our humble facilities make a life-changing difference to thousands of animals each year.

New Clinic at Stowmarket Football Ground

We have partnered with Bury St Edmund's Veterinary Centre to offer low-cost veterinary consults, vaccinations, and health checks from their mobile clinic at Stowmarket Football ground. 'Walk Up Wednesdays' welcome pet owners on benefits and low incomes between 1pm and 3pm with no appointment needed.

Financial Support for Urgent Veterinary Care

Working with vets throughout our branch area we contribute towards the cost of urgent and emergency veterinary care where owners simply can't afford treatment. One recent example was a young dog who needed her leg amputated after being hit by a car. We were able to fund a third of the cost to ensure a happy outcome for both the pup and her owner.

Pet Food Banks

Thanks to a donation, we were able to provide over 100kg of dog and cat food to local food banks to issue on our behalf. We also match-funded the donation to distribute further supplies through foodbanks in the community and at our Ipswich shops and clinic.

Pid you know?...

In the first four months of this year we helped 738 pet owners on low incomes access subsidised veterinary care.

They will often run up their ramp to greet us in the morning.

We're looking for a lovely home that can provide Kian and Mark with plenty of secure space to explore, and someone who can continue patient and positive reinforcement to ensure the boys continue to feel comfortable and safe. In case you've never owned a ferret, or don't know much about them, here are some fun facts for you:

- A group of ferrets is called a business
- Ferrets spend much of their day in a deep sleep and are often only awake for between 4 and 8 hours a day

All the ferrets in our care are trained to use a litter tray, making their daily clean super easy!

Animal Care Tips: Microchipping for cats becomes law!

New rules mean cats must be microchipped before they reach the age of 20 weeks, and that **all owners must have their cat microchipped by 10th June 2024.** Owners found not to have microchipped their cat will have 21 days to have one implanted or may face a fine of up to £500.

I have a cat, what do I need to do?

- If you have rehomed your cat from RSPCA Suffolk Central or another registered charity, your cat should already be microchipped.
- If you are not sure if your cat is microchipped, ask your vet to scan and check next time you take your pet for a check-up.
- Ensure your details are up to date. If you have moved house or changed your contact details, it is essential you update them on the microchip database directly or through your vet.
- It will not be compulsory for free living cats that live with little or no human interaction or dependency, such as farm, feral or community cats to be microchipped. However, if you care for a feral or semi-feral cat we would still recommend you have them microchipped.
- If your cat is not yet microchipped, book an appointment with your vet, or at our Animal Centre at Martlesham as soon as possible to ensure you comply by June 2024.

What is microchipping?

Microchipping involves the insertion of a small chip, around the size of a grain of rice, under the animal's skin, usually between the shoulder blades. Each microchip has a unique serial number that is registered on a database. If an animal is found lost or injured, the microchip can be read with a scanner so the pet can quickly be reunited with the owner, so it is always essential that you keep the database up to date.
